A LETTER FROM **SHARON K. ROBERSON**

President & CEO

Dear Friends,

YWCA Nashville & Middle Tennessee began our last fiscal year by removing major barriers to safety for victims of domestic violence. We welcomed a return to live events and in-person youth and community programming. And we honored our past while keeping a keen eye on the future.

By educating our elected officials, we supported the passage of life-saving legislation. On July 1, 2021, a new state law that gives victims of domestic abuse the right to terminate a lease went into effect, which happened thanks to the YWCA. We listened to the survivors who turn to the Weaver Domestic Violence Center in their greatest time of need. Many come into the shelter because they would otherwise be trapped by an abuser, unable to break their lease. This new law allows victims a safe way to escape their abusers and not be penalized. In addition, our Shear Haven Domestic Violence Awareness Training Law took effect on January 1, 2022, and thousands of Tennessee's licensed beauty professionals have taken our training.

Abbie's Safe Home opened its doors (and kennels) to the pets of survivors staying at the Weaver Center on August 24. Gail Alexander, her late mother Abbie Wallace, Amazon, and numerous supporters made this longtime dream a reality. The difficult choice to stay in an abusive home or leave a four-legged family member behind for our shelter disappeared when we cut the ribbon to our new pet shelter.

The start of the new school year saw the return of our Girls Inc. and AMEND Together programming in the classroom. The connection between our staff members and students empowers our youth to be strong, smart, and bold and practice respect and healthy masculinity. In addition, our Dress for Success and Career Services programs are building the confidence and skills to thrive in life and work. And students in our Family Learning Center (FLC) continue their studies online, at their own pace, and on their own time.

One of the sweetest stories of success this past year comes from the FLC. Ms. Betty Alexander had been working on and off to earn her High School Equivalency diploma since 1979. She entered our adult education program in 2008. During that time, she faced the death of her husband, COVID, transportation barriers, and the significant format change to the test, from GED to the five-section HiSET test. However, Ms. Betty never gave up. She worked closely with our teachers and tutors, and on May 23, she took her final section of the test and passed.

YWCA celebrated the 30th anniversary of the Academy for Women of Achievement with an outstanding group of honorees, whom we were delighted to welcome into the academy during an in-person ceremony in January. In April, we celebrated the 10th anniversary of Wine Women & Shoes, bringing our girlfriends (and some guy friends) together for an afternoon of sipping, shopping, and supporting our work and mission.

And I am extremely proud we honored our history and the African American women who made up the Blue Triangle Branch of the Nashville YWCA during Women's History Month. While the building is no longer standing, a Metro Nashville historical marker was installed and dedicated on March 29 at the corner of 17th and Pearl Streets to recognize the important contributions of the women who came before us.

For 124 years, YWCA has been a safe and welcoming place for women, girls, and families. Thanks to our dedicated staff and volunteers, combined with the generous support from our funders and friends, we are able to meet the needs of all who turn to us and move our mission forward. For all of this, I thank you.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE **SERVICES**

YWCA offers more than safety. We help break the cycle of abuse by offering a continuum of services, including the 24-hour Crisis & Support Helpline and Textline, the 65-bed Weaver Domestic Violence Center, case management, adult and children's counseling, shelter and community based support groups, community education, and Re-New at the YWCA.

Re-New was founded in 2010 to help women who are leaving the Weaver Center jump-start their lives. The volunteer-run program furnishes and decorates the homes of survivors leaving the shelter.







"Angela" is a young mother who sought help with the YWCA's domestic violence shelter. During her stay, she learned that she was pregnant. Though "Angela" had difficulty processing the news of her pregnancy, she found a strong support system in the Family Services team at the Weaver Center. She worked closely with her Family Advocate to secure prenatal health care, connect with mental health support, and locate safe and sustainable housing for her family. "Angela" also worked closely with YWCA's Career Services Specialist to obtain a full time job. Upon her exit from shelter, Re-New at the YWCA transformed her apartment into a beautiful space to call home by providing furniture, decorations, and a pantry stocked with groceries. "Angela" felt more connected to her community and more confident about her future thanks to the YWCA.





Abbie's opened nearly two months after the start of the 2021-22 fiscal year.

The region's largest emergency pet shelter for victims of domestic violence opened on the grounds of the Weaver Domestic Violence Center on August 24, 2021. Abbie's Safe Home is a critical community resource that removes a tremendous barrier for victims of domestic violence in their efforts to seek safety. Statistics show that half of all victims of abuse delay leaving because they won't leave their pets behind. Years of planning and community support culminated into this state-of-the-art, 800 square foot facility that includes high quality steel kennels, an isolation room, and two fenced-in play yards. Abbie's Safe Home is named for the late mother of YWCA board member and volunteer Gail Alexander. The new pet shelter can house up to eight dogs and six cats at a time and will allow families to stay together and heal together.

"My husband and I have been married for 24 years. He's been mean as sin for all of it. He's old now, I guess I am old too. I think I thought that he would calm down and act better as he got older. He did not. Tippy is about a year old. When she was a puppy, he picked her up by her tail and slung her at the wall because he was mad at me. She has always been anxious since that. He must have hurt her because she has not stopped chewing at her tail since then. When we got here, I was afraid that Tippy would bite Katy (pet shelter manager) because she wanted to clean her tail. She said it would be ok. I left Tippy with Katy at the pet shelter and went to go to sleep in the shelter. I have never been that tired. When I came back, she had cleaned her tail and got her a cone so Tippy couldn't chew it anymore. Thank you for taking care of my dog. My husband would not let me use money for her at the vet, and that always concerned me. Thank you for taking her to the vet for her tail. I can rest and focus on what I need to do for me because I know that she is ok."











GIRLS INC.

Girls Inc. at YWCA Nashville & Middle Tennessee inspires all girls to be strong, smart, and bold through life-changing programs and experiences that help them navigate gender, economic, and social barriers. The thoughtful combination of PEOPLE, ENVIRONMENT, and PROGRAMMING provide an immersive and highly supportive experience for the girls, and the focus on the WHOLE GIRL provides a structure of growth and development to help girls achieve and thrive. Girls Inc. provides programming across Metro Nashville Public elementary, middle and high schools and community organizations, along with Spring Break and Summer Camps.



"I've been a part of Girls Inc. since around 2016. Initially I got involved with Girls Inc. because my mom thought it would be a good opportunity for me. I was excited, but a little nervous to be able to meet and get to know new people. I have been able to participate in Spring Break Camp each year as well as our after school club at Youth Encouragement Services (YES). I love being able to do new things outside of my normal routine and socialize with girls my age.

One of my favorite memories was when we were able to visit and tour the police academy. We learned about what it takes to be an officer and it changed my perspective on jobs I could do. I love keeping up with my other Girls Inc. sisters on social media and through video games we play together. Ms. Shay also still checks in on me and makes sure I am doing well. I think all girls should join Girls Inc. because you get to experience fun things with girls your age and Girls Inc. motivates you to work hard and be successful."

AMEND Together is YWCA's community-based primary prevention program dedicated to ending violence against women and girls by engaging men and boys to challenge a culture that supports violence, cultivate healthy masculinity, and change the future for women and girls. AMEND Together partners with Metro Nashville Public Schools to provide AMEND clubs across the city where hundreds of boys are provided a safe space to talk about healthy masculinity and gender-based violence. In 2019, AMEND Together expanded into a national program, and two new clubs were added this past fiscal year. These affiliate clubs are located in Alabama, California, New York, Ohio, Texas, Virginia, and Washington.





On June 30, 2022, the Nashville Predators and Predators Foundation recommitted to supporting the AMEND Together program by donating \$100,000 to further our work and mission in the Metro Nashville community. A few months later, at the beginning of the 2022-23 season, the Preds hosted our AMEND Together students and families. Leaders of the organization and foundation presented a check to our AMEND Together leaders, Executive Director Shan Foster and YWCA President & CEO Sharon K. Roberson.





DRESS FOR SUCCESS

Dress for Success Nashville is committed to providing resources for women to thrive in work and life through a network of support, professional attire, and development tools. Dress for Success delivers long-lasting solutions to enable women to break the cycle of poverty and to be treated with dignity and respect. YWCA offers professional attire, career services, and the Professional Women's Group, empowering women to strengthen their families and shape their communities.

"Jane" visited Dress for Success Nashville in October 2021. The former Weaver Domestic Violence Center resident had started a new parttime job 10 days earlier. "Jane" was working with a dialysis clinic as a unit clerk. During her Dress for Success visit, "Jane" got four pairs of slacks, a top, a pair of shoes, earrings, a purse and four new bras. She also received three \$25 gift cards so she could purchase additional tops/blouses since we did not have what she needed in our inventory. When the busy mother of two young children is not working, she's pursuing a bachelor's degree in health science at a local university. She wants to become an ultrasound technician, and ultimately open her own clinic. She hopes to graduate in 2023. Asked how her experience at Dress for Success made a difference in her life, "Jane" said although she is employed,

"Money is still tight. I didn't have money to buy nice things to wear to work. I am just thankful. Everyone at the YWCA Nashville & Middle Tennessee has been so welcoming."



FAMILY LEARNING CENTER & CAREER SERVICES

YWCA's Family Learning Center offers high-quality, culturally sensitive, comprehensive programming to help families break the cycle of intergenerational poverty and illiteracy. The FLC's free adult education program boasts 25 percent of all HiSET (formerly GED) graduates from the Nashville region. Our teachers and tutors moved instruction online after the pandemic forced in-person classes to be suspended. Students have welcomed this new and convenient way to learn, and enrollment continues to climb. YWCA's FLC offers a career services program to support our adult learners. Our community partners include the Hispanic Family Foundation, NALC, Nashville Public Library, and NICE.

"I wanted to do this for myself, and I wanted to make sure that my grandchildren and young people would understand how important education was," said Ms. Betty Alexander.

During that time, she faced the death of her husband, COVID, transportation barriers, a significant format change to the test from GED to the five-section HiSET test. However, Ms. Betty never gave up. She worked closely with the FLC's teachers and tutors, and on May 23, she took her final section of the test and passed. SOCIAL JUSTICE ADVOCACY

YWCA Nashville & Middle Tennessee is actively engaged in advocacy that reduces violence against women and girls while promoting gender equity and racial justice. We do this through legislative and civic advocacy and education, community conversations and events, and youth advocacy summits all with the support from our highly engaged Advocacy Committee.

During the 112th General Assembly session in 2021, YWCA helped pass two pieces of anti-domestic violence legislation. The DV Lease Law went into effect on July 1, 2021 and allows victims to terminate their leases early if they are fleeing an abusive partner. The Shear Haven - Domestic Violence Awareness training for beauty professionals took effect on January 1, 2022. It requires that all licensed cosmetologists, students, barbers, manicurists, etc. in Tennessee be trained on the signs of domestic violence and how to help. This new law and training has garnered local, national, and international attention.



"I was always dreaming that one day these rallies would not be necessary, that racism would have been stamped out. Inequality would no longer exist. I would live in a nation that embraces peace and justice. At that time, I was 12. I am 70 now, and there is still a need for these types of events."

In March, we unveiled the Blue Triangle Branch historical marker at the corner of 17th and Pearl Streets. Our Advocacy Committee applied for and received the designation from the Metro Historical Commission. The marker recognizes the segregation that existed in Nashville and our own organization while highlighting the contributions of the African American women in our community.

The 21 Day Challenge campaign took place in April 2022 to engage thousands of individuals interested in learning more about systemic racism. Hundreds of individuals attended the monthly Stand Against Racism virtual Lunch & Learns, and we returned to an in-person Stand Community Rally featuring scholar and poet Caroline Randall Williams, Vice Mayor Jim Shulman, and Deputy Mayor Brenda Haywood with musical performances by Patrick Dailey, Dr. Yvonne Kendall, and Adam Smith.




